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## II. Understanding the Bible through Word Study.

<u>Introduction</u>: One profitable way of gaining a knowledge of the message of the Bible is through the systematic study of its themes, topics, or basic teaching. One of the easiest methods of doing this is through the study of various words.

- A. The book to be used in this study is the concordance. There are many on the market. Make sure you buy one that is based on the version you plan to study. <a href="Cruden">Cruden</a> Complete Concordance has been a favorite. However, it does not give you an exhaustive listing of the words nor does it tell you the root meaning of the word. An English word, for example, may be a translation of more than one Hebrew or Greek word.
- B. A good concordance to use is <u>Strong's Exhaustive Concordance</u>. This is based on the King James Version. The following suggestions may help you to understand how to use this important tool.
  - 1. Look up the word "power" in the main concordance. Note how many reference there are! Go to John 1:12- Note in the right hand column the designation is followed by a number 1849. Now turn to the section in the back of the book entitled Greek Dictionary of the New Testament and look up the number. The first item is the Greek word, the second is the English transliteration of the Greek, and the third is the phonetic pronunciation. The designation 1832 tells you the root word from which the one in 1849 is derived. Then you have a presentation of the various words suggested as a translation. This word should be translated "right," "authority," or "privilege.
  - 2. Go back to "power" in the main concordance. Note the numbers following Acts 1:8 and Col. 1:11 are different. Check out how they are different by use of the Greek Dictionary. What lesson does this teach us?

John 1:12-1849 — exousia — right, authority, or privilege. Acts 1:8-1411 — dunamis — miraculous might, or ability. Colossians 1:11-2904 — kratos — vigor, strength.
